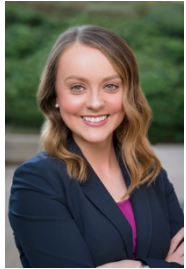


Ethical Interventions with Older Adults: Balancing Safety with Autonomy

Healthcare professionals working with older adults will encounter challenges related to self-neglect, hoarding, non-compliance, help-rejecting behaviors, and denial. You will have clients who are living in unsafe conditions, who lack adequate care, and who resist making necessary changes. This educational seminar will cover the ethical interventions social workers, nurses, and case managers can employ. The staff, at Hurley Elder Care Law, will explore the healthcare worker's role when working with older adult clients and will discuss mandated reporting; self-neglect as a legal issue; assessing hoarding behaviors; understanding dementia and competency; and guardianship options
